HOUSE BILL 2443 - OHV "INDICIA"

House Bill 2443 has successfully passed through the House with a 51-4 vote. This is the original Copper Sticker that has now been renamed the "Indicia."

The bill will now go on to the Senate.

Following is information regarding the bill as it was when it passed the house:

Legislature to Debate House Bill 2443, the Off-highway Vehicle Recreation Bill

The Arizona House of Representatives is tentatively scheduled to debate House Bill 2443 Thursday March 7th, 2007. As you recall this bill was introduced in the Legislature by Representative Jerry Weiers and is the result of the Workgroup's and a broad coalition of stakeholder's collaborative efforts.

HB 2443 Provisions

- Off-highway vehicle recreational use has increased by roughly 350 percent, or nearly 39 percent per year since 1998. During this time funding for off-highway vehicle recreation has grown by an average of approximately 4 percent, essentially only keeping

pace with inflation. While keeping pace with inflation, the funding, and as a result OHV recreation management has come far from keeping pace with the dramatic increase in OHV recreation in Arizona.

- Appropriates funding to bolster resources for Off-highway Vehicle Management in Arizona in key areas identified by stakeholders including off-highway vehicle facilities, access, law enforcement, education and safety.
- Provides new laws that will better protect Arizona's natural resources from inappropriate use of OHVs.
- Improvements to safety equipment including a requirement for individuals younger than 18 to wear appropriate headgear.
 - An annual flat fee and a three dollar Vehicle License Tax for the registration of ATVs:
 - Reduced costs to consumer (VLT currently averages \$97 per ATV, new cost anticipated to be much lower)
 - Includes ATVs, ATC's, (Dirt Bikes and four-wheelers), and UTV's (Utility Vehicles like Rangers, Rhinos, and Gators)
 - Required equipment affidavit allows for street legal registration for only three dollars.

Resolving Problems in Recreational Clubs Dealing with Partners, Possible, and Poops

(From the article series: "Empowering Leadership")

I have finally discovered the biggest problem with trying to keep clubs alive and well. Yup, after all these years as a writer, outdoorsman, and facilitator, I have found the secret to what causes our clubs and organizations to fall apart or at least get rusty. Oh, and if you're saying to yourself that it's not your club at issue, then keep reading because I predict that every recreationist in our country will face this issue sooner or later.

Not only will I share with you here the biggest problem we have, but I will also offer some sound solutions to resolving problems within recreational clubs and organizations.

To add some credibility to what I'm about to show you, I can assure you that dozens of recreational leaders have verified my thesis that all clubs have or will have this problem. I have developed and maintained a network of leaders in our sports who communicate intelligently about problems we face and opportunities we have. The consensus is clear. Our biggest problem is that we are people.

I suspect you already knew this and my big revelation was not a surprise. People – we humans – cause our own problems and inherently bring them with us where ever we go. It's "human nature" as they say. And more big news – we can't get away from it. We have to deal with it.

The way I see it, we have three types of folks in our clubs; 1) our Partners – home boys, "doods", friends, think-a-likes, etc. that don't cause problems because they agree with us for the most part; 2) the "Possibles" – they can swing either way, but right now they're not very active but they're also not causing any problems;

and 3) the "Poops" who seem to be causing the club to bunch up their knickers and get cranky with each other. It's the "Poops" we need to focus on.

- In stead of writing a book about our basic problems, allow me to summarize what you probably have already figured out by saying:
- It's human nature to disagree and have conflict
- Some of us are hard-headed and don't see things other than our own way
- We tend to attract to others who think along familiar lines
- Some personalities just don't mix
- Cliques develop in groups and leaders emerge naturally
- We could all use some help with our communication skills

So we gather up in our clubs and butt heads, find new things to get cranky about, disagree distastefully, get mad, and some times leave. Leaders burnout after a short period of time, because solving these human nature issues can be time-consuming and energy-draining. We can't afford to have any more leaders burn out; and we certainly would rather have a club that is fun to be part of. Let's look at how to do that.

STEP 1: Find Out.

The first thing to do is find out why clubs have problems -- to recognize and accept the fact that we are people and we have shortfalls, as well as personalities. Learn to accept the basic fact that we are not all poured from the same mold. In stead, find ways to understand and make better use of our differences. But that comes from first finding out (identifying) just what causes our club problems.

STEP 2: Focus.

Next, focus on the issue or problem, not the personalities. Learn to separate a problem from the person who seems to be causing it. Lay the problem on the table, dissect it and figure out how to put it back together in better shape than when you started. Enlist the help of the person you think is responsible for the issue, if possible. Get them to become

part of the solution. But whatever you do, learn to address the issue, not the person or personality. It's not Joe that is causing the club to drift apart; it's something Joe is doing – his behavior. That is what we must focus on – the behavior that needs changing.

STEP 3: Facilitate.

Facilitation is a skill every leader or club activist should develop to some level.

To facilitate means to make things easier – to lessen the resistance; to smooth the path. In clubs and groups it means finding ways to help people help them selves. Once you find out what is really the issue, and you focus on that issue, you then begin to facilitate a resolution. In volunteer organizations there is seldom a rank structure (like the military), so we must learn to ease the resistance and smooth the path with facilitative skills and techniques.

Some of those facilitative techniques include increased listening skills; improved communication skills; letting people solve their own problems by helping them see the real problem; laying out options and possibilities in clearer and cleaner terms; and learning to not get mad every time things don't go your way so you can continue to facilitate the growth of your club.

SUMMARY: You can read any number of books on this subject to improve your chances of success. You can sign up for training courses. But whatever you do, recognize that the "Possibles" are just waiting for something to happen to help them decide whether they're going to be on the team, or a problem for the team.

You don't have to worry about your partners; heck, they're with you. Put them to work to help you. The "Poops" will continue to cause problems and perhaps bring down the club until someone does something about it. And there may come a time when you just have to pack it in and move on, give up and find a better

ENVIRONMENTAL AFFAIRS

The BLM and all 6 forests in Arizona are developing land use plans. We need to be involved or we stand to lose trails. Everyone should write a substantive letter to the Forest Service and BLM, outlining what you use the forest/land for, who you are, how long you have been recreating on the land, whether you are disabled, etc.

Each forest has a website. Click on planning and there will be an e-mail address for you to send your letter to.

The Havasu plan has gone to final. It is a good plan with 2 open OHV areas. 93 % of the trails are open in the Parashant and Vermillion Cliffs. The Agua Fria is done and Bradshaw is almost done. It looks like we will lose 50% in the Table Mesa area; among them is Armageddon. Please, please write letters. We will lose if you don't.

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

The Copper Sticker bill is back. It has been changed again. We are paying a lobbyist to help with the bill. Arizona Trail Riders Association and Land Use fund has donated \$5000 each for the lobbyist. We are hoping that ORBA and SEMA will donate the other \$10,000.

The lobbyist has gotten our issues back in the bill and Game and Fish will be accountable for the funds. We have enough support now from different groups that if we don't get what we want, we can kill the bill. Please, take time to go to

the legislative sessions to make your voice heard. The session closes in August.

Arizona Game and Fish Department to hold informational meetings on how to become involved in the process

April 5, 2007

Learn about federal land management planning efforts around the state.

Arizona Game and Fish Department to hold informational meetings on how to become involved in the process.

The USDA Forest Service and the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) are revising land use management plans and travel management plans statewide. These plans include updated guidelines and rules on how public lands are to be managed (including what activities are permitted), and how and where motorized travel

should occur.

The plans could potentially include proposed alternatives that change the way you currently enjoy public lands, particularly with regard to:

- Vehicular access and transportation
- Designation of open and closed roads
- Dispersed camping and/or recreation
- Motorized retrieval of lawfully taken big game by hunters

Public input process

Each planning effort includes a public process for providing comments so that your issues are considered. The different Forest Service districts and BLM field offices are in various phases of the planning efforts.

More information can be found on the [USDA Forest Service \(Southwestern Region\)](#) and [Bureau of Land Management \(Arizona\)](#) Web sites.

The Arizona Game and Fish Department has been working, and will continue to work, to ensure that wildlife habitats, wildlife management, and wildlife-based recreation are considered in each planning effort. However, the public must also be engaged throughout the entire process to ensure that issues important to you are considered.

Informational meetings on how to become engaged in the process

The Arizona Game and Fish Department will host a series of meetings across the state to provide an overview of the Forest Service and BLM planning processes and how you can become engaged.

How do you know if you should be engaged?

OHV INFORMATION

Review the Forest Service and/or BLM proposed alternatives and ask yourself the following questions:

Access and roads

- Where do I go to enjoy the outdoors, and how do I access those areas?
- Which roads should remain open and which should be closed?
- Will these areas be available to me in the new plan?
- What areas are important to access for hunting, wildlife viewing, etc.?
- What modes of transport do I enjoy to access those areas?

Camping and recreation

- Where and how do I camp now?
- Where and how will I be able to camp once these plans are final?
- Will I be able to choose my own campsite, or will I be limited to identified sites only?
- Will I be able to collect firewood, or will I have to bring it in?

Hunting and game retrieval

- How am I able to retrieve downed big game currently? (Motorized, non-motorized, etc.)

- Will I be able to camp near where I hunt?

- How will the revised plans change or modify those allowances?

Note

Certain designations on BLM or Forest Service lands may dictate the approach to these issues, such as congressionally designated wilderness, national monuments, etc.

Regional Game and Fish Department staff will be on hand with maps and information on local areas.

If you want to learn more about the management and travel planning process and how it could affect the way you recreate on public lands, you will want to attend one of these meetings.

CAMPGROUNDS IN COLORADO MAY CLOSE

The following information was located on the Denver channel.com

DENVER -- Seventy campgrounds in Colorado could be closed under a new plan by the U.S. Forest Service.

The Forest Service's maintenance budget will be cut by 60 percent so that means it has to close campgrounds that cost too much to operate.

On the Western Slope, the Forest Service is looking at shutting down half of the 140 campgrounds and other facilities in the Grand Mesa, Uncompahgre and Gunnison national forests.

U.S. Rep. Mark Udall, a Colorado Democrat, said taking inventory of what is being used and what is cost effective makes good sense. But he said he will continue trying to increase funding to meet the Forest Service's needs.

Nothing is final yet -- the review and early proposals are just part of a long process. The Forest Service is also considering asking for more volunteer help as a way to cut costs and keep some areas open.

Do you think it makes sense to close campgrounds to save money? Or do you think the Forest Service should sell or lease out the campgrounds it can't afford to run?
